



Classical Music in Pre-Civil War American Hymnody: A Digital Anthology for Listening and Singing

Preparation of an open-access digital anthology of almost 300 hymn melodies published in the United States before 1861 derived from European classical music.

In the decades leading up to the Civil War, American compilers of sacred tune books crafted hundreds of hymn tunes from melodic stretches of European classical music. Hymn tunes being the best-selling genre of music in the U.S. at the time, it was through these melodies that many Americans first encountered classical music. This repertoire has all but vanished today, and has been only very fleetingly explored by scholars. The website proposed here will provide an online anthology of 276 pre-Civil War hymn tunes that borrow material from Mozart, Beethoven, Schubert, and other European composers, culled from over 70 antebellum American publications. Modern scores and recorded piano renditions will be provided, but the website will also offer a platform for sharing recordings of these tunes by whatever ensembles choose to submit them, forming a growing, crowdsourced repository of performances that, it is hoped, might serve as a hub for the reclamation of this repertoire in modern musical life.

Traveling to the End of Empire: Tourism and Anti-Racism in the Era of Decolonization

Research and writing leading to publication of a book on the role of tourism and decolonization after World War II.

"Traveling to the End of Empire" will be the first global history of tourism and decolonization in the twentieth century. It will explore the way that former colonies and former colonizers have used tourist infrastructure—such as museums, exhibitions, monuments, and guided tours—to come to terms with, or to erase, their colonial past. This book will define decolonization as both the formal end of empire and an ongoing process that aims to dismantle hierarchies of race and civilization. It will look critically at the ways in which sites for tourists support or ignore the broader goals of the post-1945 global anti-racism movement, with a particular emphasis on the role that UNESCO played in shaping the global landscape of tourism in the second half of the twentieth century. This fellowship would support two months of research in the United Kingdom. [Edited by staff]

The Majimaji Rebellion: New Perspectives and New Directions

To support field research and a conference leading to a history of the Majimaji rebellion (1905-07) in Tanzania.

The Majimaji rebellion in Tanzania (1905-7) has been almost universally understood as a massive anticolonial movement. In the 1970s, historians of newly independent African states embraced the rebellion as an early example of "national" African unity against European rule. This project will reopen the study of Majimaji, in response to new developments in Tanzanian and in world history. We will bring together new empirical materials as well as new theoretical perspectives in an unusual combination of conference, field research, and scholarly publication. The project will be completed just before the centenary of Majimaji.



Grenzenlos Deutsch: an Inclusive Curriculum for German Studies

The creation of a digital open educational resource for German language and culture. The applicants aim to produce an alternative to traditional textbooks by developing an interactive and immersive environment for language and culture that makes use of videos and interviews with native and near-native German speakers.

We seek a Level II grant to complete Grenzenlos Deutsch, an online, open-access curriculum for introductory German language and culture courses that creates an inclusive and interactive learning experience. The curriculum, started by Professors Brigetta (Britt) Abel and Amy Young during their sabbatical leaves in the fall of 2016, is intended as a no-cost alternative to current traditional textbooks in the field. Funding will be used primarily for the formation of a Collaborative Working Group of German faculty to assemble for further development and completion this full-year curriculum, which mixes materials from real-world, contemporary communication scenarios, multimedia content, and online learning activities. Firmly rooted in humanities, including language and culture, this curriculum will be openly available to German Studies teachers and learners worldwide, and our project will present a viable alternative to traditional textbooks across humanities fields.

Mapping Racial Covenants in the United States: A Technical Toolkit

To expand and refine a set of digital tools and workflows to generate and map datasets of racial covenants from communities across the United States within one web platform.

Through a process of experimentation over the last four years, Mapping Prejudice has developed a powerful, new methodology that combines optical character recognition (OCR), crowd-sourcing and geographic information science (GIS), to map racial covenants found in property deeds at an unprecedented level of granularity. This has allowed the project to create a comprehensive spatial dataset of racial covenants for Hennepin County, Minnesota (Minneapolis and the surrounding suburbs)—the first such dataset in the country. The Mapping Prejudice team will leverage what it has learned from mapping racial covenants in Hennepin County to open up new opportunities for public engagement and research on the history of segregation and the urban environment in the United States.

Further development of the virtual Hill Museum and Manuscript Library, a digital portal that provides online access to manuscript collections from Africa, the Middle East, and Europe. This phase of the project would support development of the platform's underlying technical framework as well as features to enhance the researcher experience.

The Hill Museum & Manuscript Library (HMML) at Saint John's University, Collegeville, Minnesota, seeks support for the next phase of development for its recently-launched vHMML platform for manuscript studies (www.vhmml.org). vHMML 1.0 was released in October 2015 with resources to support the use of manuscripts in research; vHMML 2.0 launched in August 2016 with an online Reading Room that is making tens of thousands of otherwise inaccessible and often endangered manuscript books and archival documents available to users around the world free of charge. NEH funding will make it possible to create vHMML 3.0, with greatly increased discoverability of manuscripts and metadata, and much richer data sharing with other digital humanities projects. vHMML 3.0 will add features requested by partner projects and researchers, and NEH support in both outright and matching funds will sustain the human resources needed to guarantee best-practice administration and continued development of vHMML.

Humanities in Action (HIA) is a five-course honors curriculum which places the skills and values cultivated by the humanities at the center of student learning. We are seeking funding to develop and integrate two key features of HIA: interdisciplinary team-taught courses and a culminating experiential learning component. The interdisciplinary courses examine scientific, social scientific, and mathematical knowledge and reasoning in specific social and cultural contexts to illustrate how these factors complicate the acquisition and application of "objective" results. Armed with this knowledge and the tools and skills of different disciplines, students will design and operationalize experiential learning projects for the Humanities in Action capstone. The purpose of this project is to create a student-driven podcast that will use student voices to disseminate information and ideas about the Red Lake Ojibwe language, culture, and history to the Red Lake community, Red Lake tribal members living off the reservation, and the public. The goal is to enhance student-centered learning and student engagement with the humanities at Red Lake Nation College. The content of this podcast, while stemming from class assignments, will be in the voice of our students. The podcast will be a product of their collective and individual knowledge. It is a way for students to actively engage in both their humanities education as well as their Red Lake language, history, and culture. The impact of a student-driven podcast focused on Ojibwe language, culture, and history would be formidable in terms of increased student engagement and motivation as well as oral and written communication skills.

A summer seminar for K-12 schoolteachers that uses digital resources to explore the art, architecture, and archaeology of ancient Rome.

Digital Ancient Rome is a K-12 summer seminar that will give teachers the opportunity to learn about the most important examples of Roman art, architecture, and archaeology through the latest digital resources. Material culture was not secondary to texts for most Romans in both shaping and reflecting meaning in their lives. Many aspects of their cultural, social, political, and historical understanding would have been communicated and passed on through art, artifacts, and their built environment. In this seminar teachers will become familiar with a wide variety of famous monuments and buildings from Rome - such as the Forum, Pantheon, Ara Pacis and column of Trajan - in addition to the evidence from Pompeii and Herculaneum that tells us so much about daily life. The teachers will then be equipped to take these digital resources back into their classrooms and give their students a fascinating and interdisciplinary view of the Roman world.

Rhizomes of Mexican American Art since 1848: An Online Portal

A planning project to develop a digital portal to information and archival sources on Mexican American art. The activities would lay the groundwork for establishing future partnerships with small institutions and for building a database for Mexican American art nationwide.

The University of Minnesota, The University of Texas, Rio Grande Valley, and the National Museum of Mexican Art (NMMA) seek an NEH HCRR Foundations grant to undertake planning efforts for an online portal, Rhizomes of Mexican Art since 1848, that will aggregate Mexican American art and related documentation from existing digital collections across the nation. Art attributed to Mexican heritage artists living in the United States is a rich aesthetic tradition that enhances how humanities scholars think about American art, history, and culture. Co-PDs Davalos and Cortez with a team of scholars and technical specialists will convene online and in-person to produce three Foundations-level outcomes: 1) a protocol by which relevant content from small-budget institutions feed into Rhizomes; 2) a curated search strategy, new metadata, and controlled vocabularies; and 3) submission of proposals for adoption of new metadata schema by the Getty Research Institute and the NMMA.







- Narrative contains new questions for applicants to address, such as describing how projects benefit its team members and how staff contributions will be credited.

Reminders:

- Applications will be declared ineligible for review if they do not include all required sections and components (i.e., Budget form with a Budget Justification, Biographies and not CVs).
- Applications will be declared ineligible for review if they do not comply with all requirements indicated with a "must" outlined in the NOFO, including page limits.
- Abstracts, Table of Contents, and page numbering are no longer required.






